INGLAND has long boasted of what is termed a free press, but it is a matter of opinion Whether in this, as in some other matters, liberty has not degenerated into licentiousness. and whether the tendency of modern journalism in certain of its departments to attack the private character of individuals, and to rake up family secrets and lay bare the details of private life, is not fast becoming a national disgrace. That literature, in its more permanent forms, has hitherto been preserved from the vices of the more ephemeral publications is a matter for satisfaction, but as any actual lowering of the standard of the press must ultimately be reflected in the works of our national authors, it is to be hoped that a protest will be made against the system, and that every discouragement will be offered to it. It would, indeed, be a loss to the country if the press were to be fettered by any such censorship as exists in several countries on the Continent; but, at the same time, if public decency is outraged, as has of late been too frequently the case, many men will wish for the exercise of a little of the paternal control which General Melikoff is just now exercising over the editors at St. Petersburg. As a check to gentlemen of the fourth estate who allow their desire to give startling news to overbalance their judgment, it may be useful to cite a case which occurred in the law courts at Paris on Tuesday, where M. de Woestyne, a French journalist, was convicted of libelling Colonel Jung by an article in the Gaulois, which accused him by implication of having abstracted certain missing documents at the Ministry of War. M. de Woestyne was sentenced to six months' imprisonment, 1,000f. fine, and 5,000f. damages, and the manager of the Gaulois was ordered to pay a fine of 500f. General Ney, who was called, admitted having mentioned the scandal to M. de Woestyne during a ride in the Bois de Boulogne, and the defence of the prisoner was that when anybody tells a journalist anything it is understood that the latter may publish it. The French Court protested against such a theory, and it seems to us that it would be a decided gain to England if a similar protest were to be made here.

The Library Association held its third annual conference, October 5-7, at Edinburgh, which, as the northern capital of letters, was a peculiarly appropriate place for this, as for the Social Science Congress meeting the same week. The coincidence was spoken of as a happy one, since the Library Association also aims, through its agency of the spread of books, at the improvement of society, and might be regarded as a co-ordinate section of the Congress. Mr. J. Small, librarian of Edinburgh University, presided at the opening meeting, and after emphasising the importance of the association as a means of raising the standard of the profession, especially by fostering the better training of library assistants, gave a pleasant sketch of Edinburgh libraries, and expressed the hope that a free public library, as suggested by that untiring philanthropist, Dr. William Chambers, so far back as 1863, might ultimately be added to them. The Report of Council, read by Mr. Ernest C. Thomas, the secretary, showed a membership roll of 240, and expressed the belief that the Bill for consolidating and amending the Library Acts, prepared by Messrs. Nicholson and Tedder, would receive favourable consideration in the next Parliament. Mr. J. T. Clark, keeper of the Advocates' Library, read a valuable paper on 'Early Printing in Scotland,' which he supplemented, when the members of the Conference visited his library later, by showing the interesting examples in its possession; and other papers were especially interesting for their treatment of appropriate local subjects. A paper on copyright was read by Mr. R. A. Macfie, presenting his wellknown views in favour of a royalty system, under which, after the issue of the first edition of a book, or at the end of the first year, any publisher may reprint, Government regulations insuring to the author a return of 5 per cent. It may be mentioned that a similar paper was read by him in the International Law Section of the Social Science Association, where also one was presented from C. H. E. Carmichael, Esq., expressing a fear that the recent decision of the United States Supreme Court, adverse to international protection of trade-marks, might tend to preclude international copyright, which, it was pointed out in the ensuing discussion, was quite unfounded. Mr. Cornelius Walford presented a suggestion for the utilisation of duplicates, by posting to other libraries slips giving titles of books for exchange; and, in a discussion following, strong testimony was borne to the value of the book-trade journals as a means for Mr. Nicholson, whose experiments with procuring and disposing of individual copies. buckram as a binding material have resulted unfavourably, presented a resolution for a general inquiry among binders as to methods and cost. Committee reports were presented on 'Uniform Rules for Cataloguing,' and on 'Indicators,' the last-named declining to recommend any particular pattern. The proposed rules were discussed minutely, Mr. Bullen, of the British Museum, and others taking part; and, although there was some manifestation of the too frequent tendency to subordinate human nature to cataloguing, rather than the proper contrary, useful progress was made, by the adoption of about half the rules, towards a code which will at least serve the purpose of suggestions to the large middle-class of librarians who are desirous of utilising the general experience for the benefit of their readers. In place of a more extended report from the Committee on a General Catalogue of English Literature, Mr. E. C. Thomas renewed his proposal to make an experimental catalogue covering the letter Q. Rev. H. O. Coxe, of the Bodleian, was elected president, and it was decided to meet next at Cambridge, earlier in the year. Among the pleasant social features were a dinner to the visiting librarians, at which the Lord Provost presided, and Mr. Adam Black responded to a toast to the publishing trade, and visits to the libraries and publishing establishments of Edinburgh—Messrs. Chambers, Nelson, Johnston, and others having hospitably thrown open their doors to the visitors. The entente cordiale between librarians and publishers was agreeably noticeable.

Mr. Bernard Quaritch has crowned his labours as a bibliographer with a volume which, in its mere bulk, is one of the curiosities of literature. The number of pages approaches 3,400, with the effect that the book's thickness exceeds the breadth of the leaves somewhat. But the contents of the volume are the true marvel, whether in the magnificence of the ornate books, the treasures of learning, the labour which has assembled and arranged them, or the special and varied knowledge which has commented on and made known the qualities of interesting articles. Mr. Quaritch's catalogue opens with sixty odd pages of illuminated MSS., the first of which is an Evangelistorium, with miniatures, rated at £1,000. Apart from these is, in the body of the work, an MS. of the twelfth century, with more than 100 miniatures, in the old binding, rated at £1,600, and so on. These will give an idea of the riches and rarity of the collection. Its treasures are unlocked by an index, which occupies about 240 pages. Each page holding some 240 lines, we have no less than 60,000, or thereabouts, of index entries alone. Altogether Mr. Quaritch's catalogue is a monument.

Mr. Ruskin, among his numerous claims to pre-eminence, certainly stands first in the ranks of those who love to 'call a spade a spade.' In a letter addressed to the Conservative students of Glasgow University, in answer to a note addressed to him in the month of July regarding his candidature as Lord Rector, he says:—'What in the Devil's name have you to do with either Mr. Disraeli or Mr. Gladstone? You are students at the University, and have no more business with politics than you have with rat-catching. Had you ever read ten words of mine with understanding, you would have known that I care no more either for Mr. Disraeli or Mr. Gladstone than for two old bagpipes, with the drones going by steam, but that I hate all Liberalism as I do Beelzebub; and that, with Carlyle, I stand—we two alone now in England—for God and the Queen.' This utterance has, we are not surprised to learn, given dissatisfaction to a number of the independent students of the University, who have asked Mr. Henry Irving to allow himself to be nominated for the Lord Rectorship. Mr. Irving has, we understand, said that, if it were a general wish of the students, he could only reply in the affirmative.

The fashionable city of Bath seems determined to win for itself a questionable fame by its continued antagonism to the spread of public enlightenment through the agency of the free library movement. A resident having, three years ago, offered to present the city with a building worth £3,000 for a free library, the burgesses were polled and refused to adopt the Act. During the last three years the institution has been carried on by subscriptions, and last week the burgesses were again polled, when the majority against a rate-aided library was nearly 2,000. We have no information as to the incidence of local taxation in Bath as compared with other towns, but we can scarcely imagine the fiscal burdens of the ratepayers to be so heavy as to justify their action.

The will of Mr. W. H. G. Kingston has been proved, and the personalty sworn under

£4,000.

Sermon manufacture, as a branch of literary trading, seems still to be flourishing; and one of the manufacturers has just obtained a county court judgment against a creditor, who, while using his wares, neglected to pay for them. The case was heard at the Nuneaton County Court, where J. T. Collett, describing himself as a Master of Arts and an author, residing at Nuneaton, sued an Oxfordshire clergyman for 10s. 6d., the value of a sermon written by the plaintiff, and alleged to have been supplied to the defendant. There being no appearance on

behalf of the defendant, judgment was for the plaintiff.

Dr. Dawson Turner, writing from 13 Salisbury Street, Strand, once more appeals for assistance in providing reading for hospital patients. He says that the publication of two short letters of his about a year ago brought him 750 large parcels of books, magazines, both secular and religious, and light literature generally for patients in London hospitals. All have been distributed, much to the solace and comfort of many hundreds of the sick and crippled. He now says 'Repetatur haustus,' and adds that the head porters of Westminster and Charing Cross Hospitals will gladly receive anything that may be sent for him addressed,

carriage paid, to their care.

A new edition of Lassalle's 'System der erworbenen Rechte' (system of acquired rights) is expected to appear in a few days, with a preface from the pen of Privy Councillor Lothar Bucher, a man of great account in the Foreign Office, and the trusted secretary and adherent of Prince Bismarck. As one of the Democratic 'Steuerverweigerer,' or tax-refusers, Herr Bucher in his youth had to seek a temporary asylum in England, where he employed himself with journalism; and it is a proof of the singular character of the man that, though sympathetically intimate with Lassalle, and made by that Socialist philosopher his literary executor and legatee, he is now the right-hand man, if not, indeed, the right hand, of Prince Bismarck.

We are asked to say that the reference library of the London Institution is re-opened to

all persons having reading tickets.

The 25th annual report of the Cambridge Free Public Library shows a very trifling decrease in the total issue of books for the past year as compared with that immediately preceding. Readers are allowed to help themselves to the books in the reading-room library; and it is gratifying to learn that not only has no volume been lost within the twelvementh, but that a small book taken from the room five years since has been returned to the shelves. The total number of volumes in the libraries is 24,747.

Mr. Charles Mackeson will contribute an article on the London Hospitals, their History

and Management, to the Companion to the British Almanac for 1881.

Among the reprints which Mr. Elliot Stock will issue shortly will be a facsimile of the first edition of 'Robinson Crusoe,' reproduced from the very fine copy in the library of Mr. Huth.

Mr. H. P. Hubbard, advertising agent, New Haven, Conn., sends us a volume which we will describe in the words of the title-page, 'Right Hand Records and Newspaper Directory. It gives, in alphabetical order, towns in each State, with population, papers in each town (i.e. names of the newspapers published there), with circulation, with blank space for recording contracts, estimates, offers, acceptances, or any other data. It is a complete list of all American newspapers and of the leading newspapers of the world.' The 'Right Hand Record' is a neatly printed volume of 400 or 500 pages, 8vo., in which the information is arranged alphabetically, according to States, and alphabetically within the States, according to towns. On a rough calculation, we should say that at least ten thousand newspapers are named in the volume, representing an amount of energy which it is difficult for the mind to grasp. Mr. Hubbard has earned the thanks of many a 'newspaper man' on this side of the water by his handbook.

The recently published diary of Wiffen, the translator of Tasso, gives an account of a conversation with Southey on the introduction of railways, from which it appears that he looked forward to the use of the iron road as a means of relieving the stagnation of trade. The conversation took place in 1819, and it is quoted in the St. James's Gazette as an evidence

that Southey's hostility to manufactures was not so great as is generally supposed.

The Rev. H. O. Coxe, Bodley's Librarian, has, it is stated, felt obliged by failing health to tender his resignation of the rectory of Wytham; but, as the Guardian's correspondent remarks, the University will be the gainer, if this relief from parochial duties helps to prolong Mr. Coxe's rule over the great library which he has served so faithfully for twenty years, and with which his name and genial presence are associated in the recollection of so many visitors to Oxford.

At the recent meeting of the United Kingdom Library Association at Edinburgh, a motion in favour of opening museums and libraries on Sunday was set aside by a resolution to pass

to the next business, which was carried by thirty-eight to eight.

A correspondent of the *Times* desires to ascertain what has become of the memorial of Milton existing on the church wall which was recently pulled down in Bread Street, in the form of an inscription stating where the poet was born in that street, and also those quaint old verses in the poet's honour beginning—

'Three poets in three distant ages born Greece, Italy, and England did adorn,' &c.

The writer says, 'Where is that interesting old record now? I looked for it in vain in Bread Street when I was there last, and, surely, it deserves a public and appropriate

resting-place.'

The provisional committee of the Topographical Society of London, which has been formed for the purpose of collecting and publishing maps, views, and other materials for the history of London, have, we are glad to learn, received sufficient promises of support to justify them in announcing the holding of the inaugural meeting of the society on Thursday, the 28th inst. The Lord Mayor has granted the use of the Long Parlour at the Mansion House, and will preside on the occasion.

The Common Good is the title of a new paper, of which the first number has reached us. Its aim is (1) to promote a better understanding and more mutually profitable relations between capital and labour; (2) the development of technical education; (3) the political education of the people; (4) the promotion of working men's clubs and kindred societies.

Professor Henry Morley is lecturing on the 'Characteristics of English Literature' at

St. James's Lecture Hall, Holloway.

Canon Tristram, whose efforts in connection with the Palestine Exploration Fund has completed a new work, entitled, 'Pathways of Palestine: a Descriptive Tour through the Holy Land,' which is to be published as a serial by Messrs. Sampson Low & Co. A portrait

of the author will, we understand, appear next week in Church Bells.

The subject of the lectures to which we referred in our last number as being delivered on Friday afternoons at the Hampstead Vestry Hall by the Rev. Alfred Ainger, Reader at the Temple, is, we are informed, 'The Literature of the Reigns of Anne and George I.' The authors included in the scheme are De Foe, Steele, Addison, Prior, Parnell, Ambrose Philips, John Philips, Pope, Swift, and Guy Arbuthnot.

AMERICAN LITERARY PROSPECTS.

The journals devoted to the interests of the book trade of America seem confident that the preparations now making by the various publishers for the autumn will involve a much larger

demand than at any time within the past few years.

Messrs. Appletons, Harper Brothers, Putnam's Sons, and Scribner's Sons, of New York, lead in the announcements of the season, but nearly every house has one or more books in hand which deserve attention. In Boston, Messrs. Little, Brown, & Co. vie with the two houses of Houghton, Mifflin, & Co., and James R. Osgood & Co., in the publication of new books. We can only mention a few of the important works, and these rather by their subjects and titles, for our next number will contain a fuller list of those promised, or likely to appear during the

season, with the names of the several publishers affixed.

Biography leads the list. The most important work in this line is Baron Grimm's 'Life and Times of Goethe,' a book which compares favourably with G. H. Lewes's volumes on the same subject published a quarter of a century ago, and is said to be admirably translated by Miss Sarah Holland Adams. The 'Life of Charles Hodge, D.D.,' of Princeton College, and 'Henry Boynton Smith: His Life and Work,' both leaders in the departments of theology and apologetics, are promised at an early date. Dr. Henry C. Angell's 'Records of William M. Hunt' forestalls the memoir of that eminent artist. The second and third volumes of General Badeau's 'Military History of U. S. Grant,' and Lippincott's 'Great Living Men of our Country,' being a Dictionary of Biographical Notices of the Distinguished Living Characters of the United States, are in preparation. In the Eggleston series of 'Famous American Indians' the fascinating history of 'Montezuma' will be told. Mr. G. M. Towle will add to his 'Young Folks' Heroes of History' 'Marco Polo: His Travels and Adventures.' Mr. Parke Godwin is also stated to be at work upon a memoir of his father-in-law, William Cullen Bryant, the Poet and Journalist. The chief historical work is the 'Memorial History of Boston, 1630-1880,' in four quarto volumes, under the chief editorship of Justin Winsor, Librarian of Harvard, the first volume of which is just ready. Perhaps next in importance is an edition of the Rev. William White's 'Memoirs of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States,' edited and annotated by the Rev. B. F. De Costa. 'The History of Procedure in England during the Norman Period, by Melville M. Bigelow; Prof. Henry Coppée's 'History of the Conquest of Spain by the Arab Moors'; a 'History of Greece,' by T. T. Timayenis; and Francis Parkman's final volume of his History of the French colonisation of Canada, entitled 'Montcalm,' will be valuable original works. Dr. Ellis's Lowell Institute Lectures on the 'Indians' will, with a new and revised edition of 'The Middle Kingdom, a Survey of the Geography, Government, &c., of the Chinese Empire, by Dr. S. Wells Williams, make their appearance during the season. Prof. Francis Bowen's 'Gleanings from a Literary Life,' the 'Miscellaneous Writings of Francis Lieber, LL.D.,' in two vols., and an elaborate work on 'British Thought and Thinkers, Critical, Biographical, and Philosophical,' by Prof. George S. Morris, will be conspicuous contributions to philosophical literature. Dr. F. C. Ewer publishes his recent lectures on 'The Operation of the Holy Spirit.' The Rev. R. Heber Newton will put into print an important series of discourses on 'Woman's Work.' Prof. J. H. Chapin will have 'The Creation and Early Development of Mankind,' and Prof. J. S. Kedney, a new writer, will be known through a philosophical volume, 'The Beautiful and the Sublime.' Among works relative to Art will be a new revised and enlarged edition of Spooner's 'Biographical and Technical Dictionary of Fine Arts,' edited by Mrs. Clara Erskine Clement. A unique book of its kind will be Mrs. John T. Sargent's 'Records and Reminiscences of the Boston Radical Club.' Henry W. Longfellow and Oliver Wendell Holmes appear each with a chaplet of verses; John Greenleaf Whittier reaches the honour of being placed beside Longfellow in a Cambridge Edition of his complete poetical works, in three vols.; William Leighton, author of 'The Sons of Godwin,' &c., comes out with a new poem entitled 'Shakspeare's Dream.' Besides these there will appear in one volume Bayard Taylor's 'Dramatic Poems,' embracing 'The Prophet,' 'The Masque of the Gods,' and 'Prince Deukalion; and William Winter, of the New York Tribune, will have a complete edition of his Poems. Literary criticism is represented by George H. Calvert's new volume on 'Coleridge, Shelley, and Goethe,' Edmund C. Stedman's able essay on 'Edgar Allan Poe,' and 'Reminiscences of a Journalist,' by Charles T. Congdon, of the New York Tribune. In the same rank may be named the Harvard edition of Shakspeare's Works in twenty volumes, the fruit of a life-long study of the Dramatist, by Henry Norman Hudson, and the latest thorough recension of his text. Medicine and Surgery will be represented by Dr. Roberts Bartholow's Treatises on 'The Practice of Medicine for the use of Students and Practitioners,' and 'Electricity as applied to Medicine and Surgery; 'The Pathology and Treatment of Syphilis,' by Dr. F. N. Otis; 'A Manual of Quantitative Chemical Analysis,' by Frederick A. Cairns; 'Elementary Chemistry,' by Prof. J. P. Cooke; and a 'History of Medical Economy during the Middle Ages,' by George F. Fort, all of which will appear shortly. A new volume in . the 'American Science' series will be 'The Human Body,' by Prof. H. Newell-Martin. Law publications will be increased by the addition of E. L. Pierce's 'Law of Railroads;' the 'Law of Chattel Mortgages,' by Leonard A. Jones; and Conway Robinson's 'Principles, Pleadings, and Practice of Courts of Equity in England and the United States,' in two 'Steam Boilers, their Design, Construction, and Management,' by William H. Shock, Chief of the Bureau of Steam Engineering, U.S. Navy, is an important scientific and technical work in active preparation. English fiction, which costs the American publisher nothing to reprint, limits the number of American novels, but Judge A. W. Tourgee's 'Bricks without Straw,' and 'A Royal Gentleman;' Lew Wallace's 'Ben-Hur: a tale of the Christ,' 'The Grandissimes: a Story of Creole Life,' by George W. Cable, George Fleming's 'The Head of Medusa,' and 'By the Tiber,' from the pen of the author of 'Signor Monaldini's Niece,' will be among the notable novels of the season, and are sure to attract attention.

BOOKSELLERS' PROVIDENT INSTITUTION.

DEAR SIR,—Upon first reading the paragraph on the Booksellers' Provident Institution in the columns of one of your contemporaries, I felt sorry he had not made a direct charge against the Institution, instead of dealing in generalities, but upon reading it a second time I could not help coming to the conclusion that it was only a happy effort at satire. My reasons for coming to such a conclusion are the

following facts gleaned from the report just issued:

No society could be mismanaged that only spent £139. 17s. 3d. in collecting £1,707 and disbursing £1,508, or about 8 per cent. of its income. It would be a difficult matter to point to another institution so economically managed. Again, if young men neglect to join an institution with over £30,000 invested in the Funds, and offering greater advantages than any kindred society, it should not be charged to the society as mismanagement, but to the young men connected with the bookselling trade who refuse to share its benefits. As a conclusive reason I do not think the society would have received the generous support from the trade that it has done had the mismanagement been real instead of satirical. Among the donors of the last few years I find the name of the proprietor of the Bookselter, £10, and am sure he would not have subscribed to an institution that could be honestly charged 'with past and present mismanagement and crippling its usefulness.'

From Messrs. Dean & Son.—'Little Folks' Fairy Library.' Each volume has abundant coloured pictures, is bound in gilt cloth, and has a coloured picture medallionwise let into the side of the cover, with a very attractive effect. One of the series contains the nursery rhymes we all were once familiar with, and another contains poetry of a kind which pleases young people, on birds, animals, and the various incidents of life and aspects of nature.

From Messrs. James Duffy & Sons.—'The Life of the Venerable Mother Mary, of the Incarnation, Joint Foundress and First Superior of the Ursulines of Quebec,' by a Religious of the Ursuline Community. The materials of this biography have been culled from two earlier sketches, published in 1677 and 1863, and the historical statements are based on the Canadian histories of the Abbé Ferland and Bancroft. It is a work which will be much valued by members of the Roman Church as a record of one of the noblest pioneers of its faith in the New World.

From Messrs. Griffith & Farran.—'The Other Side: How it Struck us,' by C. B. Berry. A

luxurious book as regards type and paper, and in style a thoroughly pleasant and unconventional description of a trans-Atlantic tour. Hotel life, street locomotion, railways, prairie villages, the natural features of the country, and life, not only in New York but in the cities of Montreal and Quebec, are sketched with evident keenness of appreciation, and the reproduction of the conversations which ensued between the author and those whom he met on his wanderings forms a lively feature in the book. It is from first to last purely descriptive. It is free from homilies and moralisings, and it is, what so few books are, emphatically true to its title. To all who wish to get a glimpse of things as they really are 'on the other side,' we can recommend Mr. Berry's genial book.

From 'Hand and Heart' Publishing Office.—
'Popular Recreation,' 'The Theatre, as It is,'
and 'The Ober-Ammergau Play.' By the Rev.
Charles Bullock, B.D. The first paper was read
by Mr. Bullock at the Sheffield Church Congress,
and the others are reprinted from Hand and
Heart, of which he is the editor. Mr. Bullock's
aim is to render recreation innocent and healthy,

mot sinful and destructive, and to promote such recreation is, he asserts, emphatically a Christian duty. His essays are written in a popular style, and ought to be helpful to the cause he desires to serve.

Thanatopsis and the Flood of Years,' by W.C. Bryant. 'The First and the Last.' There is a solemnity about even the wording of the title-page, with which the name of the first of the two poems, which divide the volume between them, is in keeping. Thanatopsis, a view of death, a looking the King of Terrors in the face, after, it may be, the Flood of Years has gone over one's soul, is a subject to make any one thoughtful. The treatment of it is almost a paraphrase of the Apostle's words:

O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?

As to the 'get up,' every page, which is in fact a sheet or leaf of ivory paper, has its double illustration, and between each is a page engraving, all protected by plate paper. The binding, of extra bevelled cloth, gilt edges, is symbolic of Mr. Bryant's span of life, and of the fruits it bore. Besides the ordinary lettering are gilt slabs at the corners which pictorially almost say:

First the blade, then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear.—MARK iv. 28.

It will interest the reader to know that the inspiration of William Blake (pictor ignotus) and of a celebrated author, also ignotus as a pictor, are acknowledged by the designer of the illustrations.

From the same.— The Undiscovered Country,' by W. D. Howells. A novel in one volume, by one of the foremost American authors of the present day, whose account of Venice we may recall as perhaps the most lifelike picture of what is found in its everyday life which has ever been written, tending to correct romantic and preconceived ideas.

From Messrs. Macmillan & Co.—' Queen's College Calendar, 1880-81.' An interesting volume for all who value the higher education of women, supplying not only full particulars as to Queen's College, Harley Street, and its curriculum, but the examination papers of the past year. We learn from a prefatory note that the College was established in 1848, and incorporated by Royal Charter in 1853. It owed its existence partly to the Governesses' Benevolent Institution, and partly to an independent movement originated by the Rev. C. G. Nicolay, and supported by the Rev. F. D. Maurice and other King's College Professors. Its objects were defined to be the General Education of Ladies, and the Granting of Certificates of Knowledge. Committee of Education, as at first constituted, included the names of Maurice, Trench, McCaul, Kingsley; of Sterndale Bennett and Hullah; of Ansted and Edward Forbes; of Mulready and Richmond. Professor Maurice was its first chairman, with Mr. Nicolay as deputy-chairman. A course of introductory lectures was given at the College in the spring of 1848, the opening lecture being on 'Queen's College, London: its Objects and Method,' by Professor Maurice. The volume containing these lectures, with an address given by Mr. Maurice, at the end of the First Term, sets forth the aims with which Queen's College was founded.

From the National Temperance Public Depôt.

—'Temperance Texts, with Illuminated Floral Borders.' We will frankly confess that until we opened this packet of tastefully coloured texts we had no idea of the number of passages in the Bible which could be quoted on the side of the temperance reformer. Such an array of verses as is here supplied is in itself a formidable argument against drunkenness, and the distribution of the little cards will doubtless serve a good purpose.

From the Religious Tract Society.—'The Boy's Own Annual,' Vol. II. The death of Mr. Kingston will cast a shade over the Christmas reading of many of the boy friends of the greatest of boys' authors, but it will be a satisfaction to them to remember that he lived long enough to see the realisation of one of his dearest wishes in the publication of the Boy's Own Paper. It may not be generally known that, several years before the 'Paper' appeared, Mr. Kingston had formed a committee to establish such a journal, and his touching letter, published in a recent number, is an evidence of the strong interest which he took in the scheme. As, however, well-laid plans and good wishes are of little avail without careful execution by hearty workers, it is satisfactory to find, in this second volume of the Boy's Own Paper, a strong proof that Dr. Macaulay has gathered round him a staff of writers well qualified for the task before them, and that they have been successful in hitting the happy medium and in providing that which is exciting and attractive without being sensational and vicious. Fiction forms the 'leading article' in each number, with R. M. Ballantyne, Ascott R. Hope, and other practised hands, as its authors; graphic sketches of adventures by flood and field and of adventures with animals compete with the tales; and there is a capital series of pen and ink sketches of 'Boys We Have Known,' in which 'the boy who is never wrong,' 'the bully,' 'the dandy,' and other familiar portraits are drawn in black and white with a good measure of success. The illustrations are, for the most part, of the same high standard as the letterpress, and the large coloured plates form a decidedly popular feature. Dr. Gordon Stables discourses on dogs; the Rev. J. G. Wood writes of birds' eggs and egg-collecting; and then indoor games and outdoor pastimes receive a large share of attention. The answers to correspondents convey a vast amount of information in a compressed form, calculated to be useful, not only to the actual inquirer, but to Taken altogether, the editor other readers. deserves warm thanks, not only from the boys, but from their parents and guardians, for supplying young people with such attractive, and, at the same time, wholesome food. In its handsome cover the annual is well fitted for a prize or birthday present.

From the same.—'The Girl's Own Annual.' Vol.

I. The problem of furnishing a paper for girls answering to the Boy's Own Paper was more difficult of solution, but, judging by the first annual volume, the want has been satisfactorily supplied; and, if we except the tales, some of which are only suited to young ladies in the upper section of their teens, there is much in its pages to please girls of every age. Household management, including cookery, and the intricacies of needlework and fancy work, receive due attention, and music, specially composed for the paper, gives variety to its contents. The littles of notable women scattered throughout the

well done, and the miscellaneous articles range over a wide series of subjects, all treated in a popular fashion. The list of artists engaged for the illustrations shows that no expense has been spared by the conductors of the paper, and the varieties and answers to correspondents—always an important part of such a journal—are capitally edited.

From Messrs. Seeley, Jackson, & Co.—'Via Latina,' by Edwin A. Abbott. A first Latin book, including accidence, rules of syntax, exercises, vocabularies, and rules for construing. Mr. Abbott shall describe the leading idea of his new way to an old tongue:—

The dictum of Lord Bacon has been borne in mind that in all kinds of training we should imitate dancers, who practise at one time in heavy boots, at another in high shoes. A considerable experience of teaching has led the author to the conclusion that a first Latin book requires a great diversity of exercises, some to illustrate special rules, others of a more general nature; some on points of accidence, the irregular nouns and verbs, and the like, others on difficulties of syntax; and again, some difficult and accompanied with helps, others easy to be done without help; some to be written with preparation, and some to be answered viet voce.

The author has thus sketched out an interesting experiment in a field or a mine which might well be considered worked out. The very freshness of the thought is a presage of success. The volume is printed in a manner which is agreeable to the eye, prominent type calls attention to important places, and copious vocabularies complete the apparatus.

From Messrs. Ward, Lock & Co.—'How to Pass Examinations for Professions and Civil Service; or, the Candidate's Guide. A Handbook for Students, Parents, and Guardians.' The author of this handy little volume gives the fullest details as to the curriculum and cost of maintenance at the various universities and colleges of the United Kingdom; details of the local examinations and of their subjects; information as to the opportunities offered by certain institutions for the higher education of women; the regulations in force in the Army and Navy and Civil Service; and full particulars as to admission to the Bar and other learned professions. The main value of such a work lies, of course, in its being corrected up to date, and in this respect the author seems to have spared no pains in order to render his guide trustworthy and practically useful. So great, however, is the educational activity of the present day that since his pages were sent to press the Victoria University, which he includes as 'in course of organisation,' has been formally inaugurated. In times like these, when nearly every position in public life is open to competition, such a guide as this cannot fail to be very widely needed, and its conciseness and excellent arrangement will make it most valuable to candidates.

From Messrs. Whittaker & Co.—'A Dictionary of Daily Blunders.' Foreigners complain of the difficulties of the English language, but a little book like this serves as a mirror of our own deficiencies in the use of our mother tongue. Few people, perhaps, are conscious of the blunders which they make in every-day conversation, and still more in letter-writing, and a little pocket-book of this sort is therefore well calculated to be useful as a corrective. If the author at times imagines his reader to be guilty of errors into which a person of average education is unlikely to fall, he at any rate errs on the right.


