## Market Intelligence.

LONDON CORN EXCHANGE, MONDAY, MARCH 10  
The arrivals of English wheat were rather large during the past week, but of barley and oats the supplies were only moderate, nor were the receipts of beans or peas from our own coast large. From Scotland nearly 8000 qrs. of oats were reported up

The supply of home-fed beasts was sufficient. The supply of home-fed beasts was sufficient numerous, but, compared with those exhibited on this day so enight, very deficient in quality. I, we scarcely ever recollect to have observed rapid a falling off in that particular as this morning. The quality, therefore, of the beasts, and the time beasts, the demand for them was steady, at this advance on last week's quotations of 2d. per lb. and the highest figure being 4s. per 8lb.; but the middle and inferior breeds were a slow inquiry, at about the same figures. From Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex and Cambridge, we received 1800 Scots and homebred beasts, of various breeds, 300 short-horned, 400 from the western and midland counties, 400 from the west, Rants, Devons, &c.; from other parts 400 of various breeds; and from Scotland 400 of the horned and polled Scots; the remainder of the flock supply being derived from the neighbourhood of the metropolis. The numbers of sheep exhibited were not so great as we expected them to be, at this time of year. Prime old downs were in steady request, and the turn deer. All other breeds were quiet, at previous figures. Calves were in limited supply, and steady request, at full prices. In pigs, the average amount of business was doing, but it was more money.

 MANCHESTER CORN MARKET, SATURDAY, MARCH 10.  
 Rather a fairer feeling has been apparent this week  
 the flour trade, and, with a fair consumptive  
 demand for that article, the former currency was  
 fully supported for prime superfine qualities, while  
 the extended low rates at which middling and inferior  
 sorts were previously purchasable were somewhat  
 reduced. There existed a moderate extent of hoarding  
 pressing in oatmeal, without change in value; but on  
 were only in limited request, at about late prices  
 our market this morning. holders of wharf most  
 required rather higher rates, but any advance  
 this difficulty obtained in the transactions than  
 occurred. A steady sale was experienced for extra  
 superfine and well-known marks of flour, at full  
 rates. In the improvement, both in demand and  
 prices, may be noted, though not sufficiently  
 able us to raise our quotations. Oats were rather  
 more inquired for, and the previous currency was  
 maintained. A fair consumptive demand existed  
 oatmeal, but no alteration in value can be reported  
 were in moderate request, at late rates.

LIVERPOOL CORN MARKET, MONDAY, MARCH 10.  
 The week's imports of wheat, oats, flour, and oatmeal  
 from Ireland are, in the aggregate, of fair amount  
 and the arrivals are light. The demand for the trade  
 as continued to exhibit a somewhat firmer feeling  
 at any advance of price has been confined to

**LIVERPOOL, CATTLE MARKET, MONDAY, MARCH 8.**—We have had a large supply of stock at market to-day but the sales were slower past; but owing to the high prices the auctioneers have been able to dispose of, the whole met with dull sales at 4d. per lb. higher than last week's prices. Beef 64d. to 64½d. mutton 63d. to 70d. per lb. Cattle imported into Liverpool from the 7th to the 10th March:—1104 cows, 5 calves, 4941 sheep, 38 lambs, 3510 pigs, 40 horses.

**RICHMOND CORN MARKET, SATURDAY, MARCH 8.**—We had a fair supply of all kinds of grain in our market to-day. — Wheat sold from 5s. to 6s. 6d.; oats 2s.

**YORK CORN MARKET, MARCH 8.**—We note a market firmer for all descriptions of grain, and a disposition on the part of farmers, to sell, except a trifling advance, which, as regards wheat and the finest malting barley, is complied with, but not in oats and beans.

**MALTON CORN MARKET, MARCH 8.**—We had moderate supply of all grain at this day's market. In the ground, and rather dear; barley, 60s.; white do., 57s.; red do., 56s.; white do., 47s.; white ditto, 43s. to 50s.; red do., old 43s. to 47s.; white do., 50s. to 54s. per qr. of 40 stone. Oats, 29s. to 30s. per qr. of 32 stn. Onions, 9½d. per stone.

**LEEDS CLOTH MARKET.**—We have this week reported a decided improvement in the aspect of trade both in the warehouses and at the Cloth Halls. The demand is principally for the home trade, but several of the shipping houses are also busy, and many manufacturers are working to order.

**LEEDS COALS MARKET, TUESDAY, MARCH 11.**—The samples of all grain are very much smaller this week than last, and of really good wheat, there is but little to show to-day. Millers having bought freely at last week's prices, and the demand consequently, is of a more restricted character; foreign ones are, however, pretty well maintained. The country trade remains dull, and only good quality attracts attention. Oats, beans, and other articles stand both in value and demand.

**SHELVY CORN MARKET, MARCH 10.**—Wheat 17s. 3s. 6d.; muslin, 14s. to 15s.; beans, 14s. to 14s. 6d. per load; oats, 18s. to 20s.; barley, 35s. per quarter. We had a good show of cattle and pigs, but a few more; pigs fetched higher prices.
