



The enormous expenditure required for the support of a large force, in a false military position, at a distance from its own frontier and its own resources, will no longer arrest every measure for the improvement of the country and of the people.

The combined army of England and of India, superior in equipment, in discipline, in valour, and in the officers by whom it is commanded, to any force which can be opposed to it in Asia, will stand in unassailable strength upon its own soil, and for ever, under the blessings of Providence, preserve the glorious empire it has won, in security and in honour. The Governor-General cannot fear the misconstruction of his motives in thus frankly announcing to surrounding states the pacific and conservative policy of his government. Affghanistan and China have seen at once the forces at his disposal, and the effect with which they can be applied. THE LATE WHOLESALE INFANTICIDE IN THE FOREST OF DEAN.

DEATH OF FRANCES BENNETT. THE MUR-DERER OF HER CHILDREN.

GLOUCESTER, Saturday.-Few occurrences have excited a more painful interest in this quarter than the investigation which terminated in the committal of Frances Bennett from Ruardean, in the Forest of Dean, to the county gaol in this city, to await her trial at the assizes. The circumstances have been stated, and are shortly these :- Frances Bennet, after the death of her husband, by whom she had several children, lived with a man named Yapp, a haulier, the children by marriage having gone elsewhere. About a month ago, Bennett, under the appreheusion that she was about to die, made a disclosure to a clergyman, in the presence of several persons, to the effect that she had six children by Yapp, but none of them had been allowed to live, she having sufficated them immediately after birth. She told where the remains of the bodies would be found. The latest murder, according to the confession of the woman, was perpetrated about Christmus last year, and the spot which she indicated as containing the remains was found on examination to conceal the most perfect skeleton of any. The truth of this horrid con-fession having in this way been placed beyond a doubt, information was sent to John Cooke, Esq., one of the county coroners, who instantly proceeded from Gloucester to Ruardean to institute an investigation. The witnesses examined on the inquest consisted chiefly of the persons to whom the woman had made the confession, including the clergyman who had communicated with the magistrate on the subject, and the persons who had found the remains of the bodies. In course of the examination of the clergyman by the coroner, it came out that he had had a second interview with the wretched woman. made some additional disclosures. The rev. They then obtained about 39s in silver, and decamped, being disturbed by the servant-maid. A large reward has been offered for their apprehension. The house of Miss Robinson, adjoins that of Mr. Ferguson, of the District Bank, Newcastle, and these houses stand far apart from the	Crompton, perceiving her danger, ran to render what assistance she could, but she also become entangled The assistance of some of the men being procured, the wheels were reversed, and Mrs. Crompton, who was found laid upon the deceased, was extricated. She was severely injured, and her left arm was torn from her body. She was conveyed home, and efforts were then made to release the poor girl. The body presented a most frightful spectacle; she was lying under the wheel; all her clothes were torn off; her body was literally cut in two, from the lower part to the head; her entrails were torn out, and lay upon the floor : part of her face was torn away, and almost every bone in her body was broken. One of her legs was found on the opposite side of the wheel. The body, thus shockingly mangled, was conveyed to the Andrew's Arms, where an inquest was held the same day before the borough coroner. Evidence of the occurrence was given, but there was no proof of blameable neglect, except that the cog-wheels might have been partitioned off. The Jury found that the deceased "died from lacerstions and fractures acci- dentally received from a cog-wheel," stating that had it not been for the injuries received by Mrs. Crompton in trying to extricate the deceased, they	adduced to justify the Court in remanding him, and strong hopes are entertained that both perpetrators of the crime will be brought to justice.
